Bridge tournament spans Minocqua's

history

Only the soft, hushed shuffle of cards was heard at the Lakeland Retirement Center in Woodruff as 132 participants were deep in concentration during the recent 55th annual Minocqua-Lakeland Sectional Bridge tournament.

The history of the Minocqua area bridge tournament is an

interesting one.

It started in 1938 when Ray Brady and Walter Fisher, both of Minocqua, traveled to Fargo, N.D. to check out a bridge ournament. They had heard from many of their bridge playng companions from different parts of the country, just what un tournament playing could be and wanted to find out for homselves. As they traveled back, Brady and Fisher decided he Minocqua area would make a fine place to have its own oumament.

They talked over the tournament idea with Dr. Gale Huber ind Rollie Haff, also of Minocqua. The four men formed a committee and traveled to Chicago, Detroit, Pittsburgh, forfolk, Milwaukee and many other cities studying the diferent tournaments and how they were run.

Before planning their first tournament in 1941 they ecided it was important to have a statewide organization and o the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Bridge Association was orn. It now has a membership of 1,200 members.

In 1941 the committee held its first tournament at 'eschek's Crawling Stone Lodge in Lac du Flambeau. Playrs from Chicago, Milwaukee and Madison traveled by rail board the 'Hiawatha,' and then were taken by car to the ssort. They paid \$15 for three days of play, meals, lodging, oats, entertainment and entry fees for all bridge games. A rst class, round trip train ticket from Chicago cost \$11.85. After a day of bridge the tournament participants were eated to campfires, Indian powwows, free movies at the leater and guided fishing tours. Ladies could even get free osiery if it was torn during tournament play compliments of oleproof and Phoenix companies of Wisconsin.

Over the years the tournament moved to different locations the Lakeland area. In 1942 and '43 the tournament was ald in the Minocqua Community building, now the Fitness enter, and for three years it was held at Voss's Birchwood odge and Koerner's Spider Lake Resort in Manitowish aters. Participants played in a pavilion located at

oerner's.

It moved to Deer Park Lodge in Manitowish Waters for 15 years, the Minoequa Country Club for about 25 years, and at Dillman's Lodge for a couple of years. For the last four years the tournament has been held at the Lakeland Retirement Center in Woodruff.
